Supporting imaginative people to nurture exciting ideas

We invest in the potential of people and organisations, valuing their capacity to see the world differently and make change happen.

Ideas and Pioneers Fund

The Ideas and Pioneers Fund provides funding for ideas to be developed from concept to set-up. These are unusual or radical ideas that have the potential to improve life chances in the UK.

Project: Scoping a new start-up on political psychology

Description:

This grant will support the scoping and development of a start-up ‘think and do tank’ at the interface of psychology and politics to address the psychological roots that can lead to political polarisation. The project will explore new approaches to rebuilding common ground across polarised groups, including in the migration and climate change debates.

Description:

This grant will support the development of Supply Change, a digital marketplace connecting public sector commissioners with vetted social enterprises. The project aims to increase the social value of public sector supply chains and to drive social impact in communities.

Project: Rights education through participatory arts with at risk migrant communities

Description:

Benjamin Morgan co-founded North East London Migrant Action and Akwaaba, a social centre for people who have migrated to London. Through this grant, he will scope and pilot a curriculum of rights education through participatory arts with at risk migrant communities in East London. He also aims to co-develop a toolkit to support grassroots groups across the UK to produce their own creative responses to social injustice.

Dr Katja Frimberger and Mr Simon Bishopp

Location: Scotland

Project: U-Animate: performance-captured storytelling for care-experienced young people

Description:

Dr Katja Frimberger, an independent researcher and former educator, and Simon Bishopp, a filmmaker and animator, will develop and pilot a filmmaking programme tailored to the learning needs of care-experienced young people in Scotland. Participants will be supported to create their own animated films using performance capture technology and in the process develop new skills, emotional literacy and confidence.

The centre will offer advocacy, legal advice and representation for UK military personnel and their families, work with external organisations, including the defence establishment, and bring together likeminded campaign and support groups to support mutual learning.

Description:

Lavinya Stennett, a young graduate specialising in African studies and development, aims to develop a curriculum that focuses on the realities and experiences of Black British people, incorporating a number of teaching methods and art forms. She plans to introduce the programme into various educational spaces and to develop a number of versions of the curriculum to suit different age groups.

Education and Learning through the Arts

We value the important role that the arts play in young people's learning and educational experiences.

The Arts-based Learning Fund encourages the development, use and sustainability of effective arts-based activities in education, offering grants to arts and cultural organisations to work with learners and teachers and to develop relationships within formal education settings. Two types of grants are available. 'Explore and Test' grants offer funding to help test new approaches or gather evidence about approaches for the first time. 'More and Better' grants offer longer, larger grants to help increase the impact and effectiveness of work which has already shown promise or positive impact.

Through this programme, emccan will bring carnival arts practice to pupils in rural schools to support the development of students' soft skills, wellbeing and educational progress.

First Story will develop a writer-in-residence model to improve creative writing and achieve whole-school change. Partnering with eight secondary schools, the programme seeks to reach and influence the whole school community through teacher continuing professional development and learning, a new student ambassador initiative and parental engagement.

KIT Theatre

and artists to facilitate workshops for pupils in Years 3-6 and to deliver continuing professional development for teachers.

Attain Academy Partnership

Working in partnership with Essex Music Services and London Music Masters, Attain Academy Partnership aims to embed music-based approaches to learning. Based on the Kodály method, the programme will focus on enhancing the Early Years and Foundation Stage curriculum in a network of schools in Essex.

Morda Church of England Primary School

Morda Church of England Primary will partner with nine schools in Shropshire and Powys to enable teachers to embed drama and inquiry for learning across the curriculum through a continuing professional development and learning programme.

Description:

Ten rural schools led by Parc Eglos School will partner with MADE, specialists in creative music and dance work in education, youth, community and health care settings, with involvement from the Minack Theatre. Through dance, drama and music, with a focus on story, narrative and play, this project aims to develop teachers' knowledge and skills in supporting the development of speech, language and communication amongst children in the schools' Nursery and Reception classes.

Prime Theatre

Prime Theatre will work in partnership with seven schools to collaborate with teachers to explore how drama and performance poetry can support the acquisition and understanding of language. This programme aims to empower teachers to develop and embed these arts-based approaches in their practice and to support children's progress in speaking and listening, reading and writing.

Real Ideas Organisation CIC

The Forge, a participatory arts commissioning and producing agency, will partner with seven schools, two of which are special educational needs and disabilities settings. This project will develop teachers' knowledge, skills and experience in using photography to support children's progress in creative writing.

Tyne & Wear Archives and Museums

Description:

Tyne & Wear Archives and Museums is a regional museum, art gallery and archives service. Through this project, the museum will partner with ten schools from Newcastle and North and South Tyneside; with local arts organisations, the Arbeia

Roman Fort, Laing Art Gallery and Segedunum Roman Fort; and with Newcastle University on research and evaluation. Drawing on the resources of museum collections and through three art forms (visual arts, craft and creative writing), the project aims to support teachers in developing pupils' communication and enquiry skills.

NHYC provides a support network for 16 to 21 year olds experiencing homelessness. They provide hot food, showers, laundry, help in finding accommodation, training and employment. They also offer counselling and a range of workshops in life skills to help young people at a pivotal moment.
